To their disappointment however, they suffered a monumental loss against Mauritania, who made history by claiming the first AFCON win in their history. Following a

successful campaign in 2019, the Algerians crashed out of the group stages - a bitter moment for the Fennecs to say the least.

Staying on the topic of defeat, this year's cup organisers have similarly suffered surprising losses at the hands of smaller footballing nations. From the glory days of Didier Drogba and Yaya Toure, this version of The Elephants has surely come a long way since then. Shockingly, the Ivorians were tactically and physically outplayed by Equitorial Guinea, who were looking to draw blood. Emilio

Nsue bagged a brace, bringing his total tally for the tournament so far to five goals. In an underdog story somewhat similar to that of Morocco's in the world cup, Equatorial Guinea can safely say that they caused the biggest upset of the AFCON so far.

#### A Call for Justice

Day 110. Calls for a ceasefire have been vetoed. Aid is still struggling to get in. Twenty-five thousand killed and sixty-five thousand wounded. Many of them are children who haven't yet turned one. Graves have been desecrated and corpses have been stolen for ridiculous reasons. As the situation grows out of control we must remind ourselves that these are not numbers. These are people with lives, families, interests and hobbies. People with aspirations, who had dreams and ambitions. People who would've changed the world if given the chance to do so. October 7th 2023 marked the beginning of a cruel 100day ethnic cleansing. In support of Palestine, people worldwide have taken

it upon themselves to boycott brands supporting the genocide of Palestine. The boycott is based on people using their purchasing power to avoid these specific brands. This movement is called the BDS movement (Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions); it has become a powerful expression of global solidarity, drawing attention to the injustice happening in Palestine. This movement is a form of peaceful resistance against Israel, addressing these issues and rectifying them in support of the suffering that the Palestinians endure. Additionally, to fuel the flame, a week-long global strike from the twenty-second of January to the twenty-eighth has been called by one of the remaining journalists in Gaza, Bisan Owda.

Bisan has dedicated her heart and soul to covering the ethnic cleansing of Palestinians in Gaza since the aggressions began on October 7th.

As boycotting ran rampant throughout the Arab world, educating others and remaining vigilant to any brands that may be supportive of the colonial cause is vital. Some notable brands are McDonalds, Starbucks, Pepsi co, and Coca-Cola. However some of these companies have been so deeply embedded in our lives, and so it becomes increasingly difficult for us to boycott these organisations. For example, eating at Roost or Birdys to replace the world-renowned KFC. Get your morning coffee from the coffee bean and tea leaf, or drink Kinzo cola instead of drinking the running blood of innocents they call cola.

Another example of a boycott is the Rosa Parks boycott. It unfolded in response to the racial segregation on public buses in Montgomery, Alabama, during the mid-20th century. Triggered by Rosa Parks' courageous act of refusing to give up her seat to a white passenger, African American residents united in a determined effort to challenge racial injustice. Commencing on December 5, 1955, the boycott involved individuals abstaining from utilising public transportation, opting

instead to walk or carpool, regardless of the considerable distances involved. This stand against discriminatory policies showcased the unwavering commitment of the community to the principles of equality and justice, illustrating the profound lengths to which people were willing to go in their pursuit of rights. This boycott moved people worldwide and caused a monumental change.

Boycotts are one of the most underestimated methods of pressure. Governments often forget that the power lies within the people, the power to influence and change.

#### Congo's iPhone Labor

Children. The perfect picture of innocence. The first image that comes to mind is often of carefree play and boundless curiosity. In the mines of Congo, that picture is painted differently, with strokes of deep red and youthful eyes aged by dust and fumes. The issue of child labour in Congolese mines, particularly in the extraction of minerals like cobalt and coltan, has gained international attention as a pressing human rights concern that needs to be dealt with immediately. However, in a world where greed rules us, the show must go on at any

The Democratic Republic of the Congo is home to numerous reserves of raw materials, including lithium, copper, cobalt, and gold. These minerals are essential to our economy with the growing demand for newer and more advanced technology. Most notably, rechargeable batteries that are used in phones and

electric cars. Smartphones on average contain around 8 grams of cobalt, while a battery for an electric car requires 1000 times that amount.

'The mines are like poison, without any safety equipment, says Betty Bambi, who runs an orphanage in Katanga. The majority of those working in the mines are subjected to manual labour without any PPE (personal protective equipment) in unsanitary conditions at the constant risk of caveins and rockslides. Mining has numerous effects on the human body, including respiratory complications such as pneumoconiosis, asbestosis, and silicosis caused by inhaling fine particles from the large amounts of dust generated by mining activities. Now imagine the kind of damage this would have on the vulnerable body of a child. According to the International Labour Organisation (ILO), an estimated forty-thousand

of the current two hundred fifty-five thousand miners are children, some as young as six years old.

In a recent landmark legal case launched against the world's largest tech companies by multiple Congolese families who lost their children in the dark tunnels of the mines, a company was named in this lawsuit, one we are all too familiar with: Apple. According to research conducted by "The Verge" around 2 billion people use Apple products. It is worth noting that almost 60% of Apple users own 3-4 products, so that is 1.2 billion people, 4.8 billion products, and 38.4 billion grams of cobalt.

An iPhone lasts three to four years on average, seven years with battery replacements. You do not need to buy a new iPhone every year. Save your money. Save a child's life. These screens of glass and bone, batteries of bloodied lithium; a glorified corpse we call a phone.

This tournament is not only a chance to experience thrilling occasions in person but a chance to bring down the borders that separate us, whether culturally or otherwise.






#### To Inspire My World
